ACADEMIC POLICIES

HOMEWORK PHILOSOPHY

Homework plays an integral role in learning and students are expected to complete all assignments. The Board of Trustees encourages students, parents, guardians, and staff to view homework connected to learning objectives as an important part of a student's daily life.

As a general guideline, the amount of homework is based on grade level, keeping in mind that different students may take slightly more or less time to complete assignments per grade level. Students should expect an average of sixty minutes of homework nightly in sixth grade, seventy minutes in seventh grade, and eighty minutes in eighth grade.

ACADEMIC HONESTY Expectation

We expect all students to behave in an honest manner at all times, especially when it comes to academics. Please see below definition and tiered levels of transgression for students who choose not to follow the academic honesty expectation.

Academic Dishonesty:

Academic Dishonesty includes taking or lending a person's work, information, ideas, research and/or documentation without properly identifying the source. The teacher's professional judgment will help determine if academic dishonesty has occurred. Forgery, another form of dishonesty, is signing any document using another's signature or identity with the intent to deceive. It is **unacceptable** to:

- look at another's paper during a test.
- talk during a test without permission.
- use any unauthorized notes.
- let someone see your paper during a test.
- take another's work or ideas and pass them off as one's own.
- give test information to others.
- submit individual projects not wholly your own.
- fabricate or alter written, computerized or lab data.
- use of another person's name or identity with the intent to deceive.
- let someone copy your work or homework.
- take a test for someone else.
- share/use computer passwords not your own.

First Violation of the Academic Honesty Policy: A grade of zero may be given for the work involved and parents will be contacted by the teacher.

Second Offense: A zero will be given for the work involved and the student will receive a referral. There will be a parent conference with student, parent, teacher and counselor or administrator.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Crittenden offers a variety of extracurricular opportunities that promote intellectual, social, emotional, and physical development in our middle school students. Some of these activities include:

All students are eligible to participate in activities at the beginning of the year. Continued participation in extracurricular and grade level activities will be granted based on consideration of the following criteria:

- The student maintains a 2.00 GPA or higher.
- The student's progress report reflects academic and/or behavioral improvement.
- The student has no suspensions and no more than two behavior referrals in the current trimester or the last trimester, depending on the situation.

Additional criteria for participation in after school sports:

- The student maintains a 2.00 GPA or better throughout the period that they are participating in the sport.
- No more than one F is allowed for students to play.
- Should a student's grade fall below a 2.00 GPA or more than one F during the course of the season, that student will be removed from the team until grades are up to par.
- Sports fees will not be refunded if a student is removed from the team.

Criteria for Eighth Grade Promotion Activities (e.g. Promotion Trip, Dance, Ceremony, etc):

- The student has a **cumulative average GPA of 2.00 or higher all three trimesters**. GPAs from all three trimesters will count toward the cumulative average GPA.
- The student has no suspensions during Trimester 3.
- The student has no more than 2 behavioral referrals during Trimester 3.

Eighth graders at risk of **not** promoting (cumulative GPA below a 2.00 for all three trimesters) may be required to:

- attend regular parent/student check-in meetings with teachers and administrators.

Eighth graders **not** meeting promotion requirements:

- will be recommended to attend summer school at the high school
- will not be allowed to participate in eighth grade end of the year activities the week prior to ceremony (i.e. promotion dance, Great America trip, eighth grade picnic, promotion ceremony)

BEYOND THE BELL (by invitation only)

Beyond the Bell is a daily, free, supervised program consisting of a homework center, clubs, and recreational activities provided by the Mountain View Whisman School District and City of Mountain View. Staff will refer and invite students to participate in BTB. (3:00-6:00 p.m.)

DRESS CODE

The Governing Board believes that the responsibility for a student's attire primarily rests with the student and the student's parents/guardians. The school district and individual schools are responsible for ensuring that student attire does not interfere with the health or safety of any student, and that student attire does not contribute to a hostile or intimidating atmosphere for any student.

Gang- Related Apparel

Attire depicting or advocating violence, criminal activity, gang-related activity (including professional sports wear and/or colors identified by the Santa Clara County Sheriff or the Mountain View Police Department as gang-affiliated), use of alcohol or drugs, pornography and hate speech are prohibited. "Gang-related apparel" is defined as apparel that reasonably could be determined to threaten the health and safety of the school environment if it were worn or displayed on a school campus (Education Code 32282).

Minimum Attire Standards

- Students must wear clothing including a shirt with pants or skirt, or the equivalent (for example dresses, leggings, or shorts) and shoes, including open-toed shoes and sandals
- **Hats and other head coverings other than headwraps are not permitted in classrooms except** when prescribed by the student's physician or as an expression of religious beliefs
- Clothing must cover the chest and lower torso (see diagram below)



- Clothing must cover undergarments. Visible waistbands or straps on undergarments worn under other clothing are not a violation.
- Clothing covering the chest and lower torso must not be see-through
- Clothing must be suitable for all scheduled classroom activities including physical education, science labs, and other activities where unique hazards or specialized attire or safety gear is required
- Gang-related apparel (see reference above) is prohibited
- Clothing must not have offensive images or language, including profanity, hate speech, pornography, or depicting or advocating violence or the use of alcohol or drugs.
- Appropriate PE clothing must be worn, or brought every day.

A student who violates these standards shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action. **A parent will be called to bring a change of clothing.**

BEHAVIOR

All students are expected to come to school prepared to learn. This means bringing needed supplies and behaving in ways that allow all students to learn and teachers to teach. When a student disrupts the learning environment, he or she may be given a “time out.” This involves the student being sent to the office for approximately ten minutes and appropriately completing a Time Out Reflection Sheet in a manner that demonstrates a readiness to return to class. The time out reflection sheet will be shared with parents. If the student is unable or unwilling to complete the Time Out Reflection Sheet form appropriately, or causes disruption while coming to the office or returning to class, the student will be kept out of class for the remainder of the block. The student will be assigned work from his/her teacher and be required to complete the work just like all other students. The student will then receive a referral, be given consequences, and the parent will be notified.

PHYSICAL SAFETY RULES

There are three basic rules to follow that will keep students and their belongings safe:

- **Keep your hands off others at all times.**
- **Keep your hands off other people’s property at all times.**
- **Respect people’s personal space.**

TEASING, TAUNTING, BULLYING, HARASSMENT, AND SEXUAL HARASSMENT

We are dedicated to eliminating bullying from our school. Bullying goes beyond simple verbal teasing and is an expression of power of one student over another. **Teasing, taunting or bullying will not be tolerated.** Sometimes friends will claim that they are “just joking” or “just fooling around.” It is important to understand that this is never an excuse for making another student feel powerless.

Types of bullying include, but are not limited to:

- **PHYSICAL:** kicking, biting, hitting, spitting, pushing, taking personal belongings, poking, and excessive tickling.
- **VERBAL/WRITTEN/SOCIAL MEDIA:** taunting, malicious teasing, name-calling, making threats, and gossiping.
- **PSYCHOLOGICAL:** spreading rumors, manipulating social relationships, exclusion, extortion or intimidation, threats, gestures, and cyber-bullying.
- **SEXUAL:** exhibitionism, voyeurism, propositioning, sexual assault, “panting,” and actual physical contact.

Any student who feels he or she is being harassed should immediately ask a teacher or adult at school for help. If the bullying persists, it is important to report it again, this time to the Principal or Assistant Principal. All complaints will be promptly and appropriately addressed. Schools are required to act upon reported incidents of sexual harassment. Discipline may include suspension and/or a recommendation for expulsion of a student found guilty of sexual harassment.

SCHOOL-WIDE DISCIPLINE PROGRAM

Students will be encouraged to follow our Panther Pillar: ***What can you do today to help others feel valued, cared for, safe, and included at Crittenden?***

We will revisit our Pillar throughout the year to maintain a safe and healthy school climate. Students will be recognized for following the Panther Pillar throughout the school year.

CONSEQUENCES

Behavior violations will result in the following types of consequences. These consequences will be administered according to the discretion of school staff, and will take the student's disciplinary record into account:

- Time-outs: Ten-minute removal from class, students will be expected to reflect on their behavior and set a goal for success before returning to the classroom. A lunch detention may follow.
- Referrals: After school detention and community service for a minimum of one hour. Parents will be notified by phone when a student must serve an after school detention.

Other possible consequences:

- Community Service: A disciplinary action given for minor infractions. Students are assigned to classroom or campus clean-up tasks at break, lunch, or after school.
- Confiscation: Items that are prohibited by school rules can be taken by any staff member and will only be returned to an authorized adult.
- Detention: A disciplinary action that requires a student to be at school beyond the regular school day. Parents/guardians will be notified in advance of the detention assignment.
- Parent Conference: A meeting between parents and teachers or administrators to discuss concerns about a student's behavior.
- Loss of privilege: to participate in events and other activities, such as field trips or dances.
- In School Suspension: a structured, self-contained classroom setting.
- Suspension: A disciplinary action that removes a student from ongoing instruction for a period of time not to exceed five days. Longer suspensions are subject to approval by the Board of Trustees. Students may not be on or around school grounds at any time while on suspension. A post-suspension conference involving the student, his/her parent or guardian, and an administrator or teacher must take place at school before the student can return to his/her regular schedule.
- Expulsion: Removal of a student from enrollment in the district as ordered by the Board of Trustees. Expulsion may be ordered for any of the acts listed under Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion. (Education Code §48900, et seq.)

OTHER GUIDELINES

LIBRARY POLICIES

Crittenden's library is an essential resource that all students and teachers can access. Students can also go to the library before school, during break and lunch, and after school to read, do homework, check grades online, etc. All students using the library must comply with library rules, which include, but are not limited to the following:

- Students may check out up to two books at a time (not including textbooks), unless they have one or more overdue or lost books that have not been returned or paid for.
- **Disruptive students will be asked to leave the library.**

CELL PHONES

Cell Phones are not allowed to be used for non-academic purposes during school hours (after the morning bell and before the dismissal bell). Students **MUST keep their phones off and put away in backpacks**, unless given permission to use them for academic purposes in class. **The school is not responsible for the loss or destruction of any electronic devices.**

A cell phone being used for non-academic purposes during school hours will be confiscated and must be picked up by an authorized adult before or after school. We will release a confiscated mobile phone to an adult that is listed on the student's emergency card.

NON-ACADEMIC STUDENT ITEMS

- Valuable items of any kind should not be brought to school. Crittenden Middle School is not responsible for loss or theft of personal items or valuables.
- Possession of any object having the potential to inflict injury or damage upon another person or their property will be confiscated. Students bringing weapons of any kind are subject to arrest and expulsion. **A knife of any length is considered a weapon, even a pocket knife or multi-tool.**
- Skateboards, roller blades, scooters, toys, or any items disruptive to the educational environment are not allowed to be used on campus. If used as transportation to school, they are not to be ridden on campus and must be stored at the storage spot in the bike cage during the day. Students must use safety equipment, i.e. helmets and secure their equipment with a lock.
- Students must walk their bikes on campus, place them in the bike cage, and lock them. The school assumes no responsibility for theft. Bicycles should be licensed with the police department. Students must wear safety helmets.
- Matches, lighters, stink bombs, any kind of noise-making devices including poppers, firecrackers, etc., are not allowed at school. Students will be subject to suspension.
- Metallic paint, aerosol cans, or permanent markers are not allowed and will be confiscated.
- The use, sale, or possession of any drugs or illegal substances by students on or near the school grounds is in violation of state law and is cause for arrest, suspension, or expulsion from school.
- Smoking, vaping or having tobacco in any form on school premises may be cause for suspension and arrest.

Auto-dialer and auto-emailer. Families will often be contacted via automatic dialer and/or automatic emailer. **Please make sure that the office always has your most current contact information: email, mobile phone, work phone, and home phone. If your information changes, report it to the main office immediately.**

ATTENDANCE

Students should be on campus when the first bell rings at 8:21 a.m. **Students who are not in class when the second bell rings, will be considered tardy.**

Students must leave campus immediately after school unless involved in an authorized and supervised activity. On minimum days dismissal time is 12:50 p.m. There are no after-school classes or activities on minimum days unless specified.

Additional important attendance information:

- The law requires regular attendance at school.
- Absences are excused for student illness, medical/dental appointments, funerals of close family members, religious activities, and court appearances.
- Parents/guardians must verify all absences. Call the absence hotline either the evening before or by 8:30 a.m. the morning of the absence and state the reason for the absence. The number is 650-903-6945, ext. 2.
- If a student is late to school for any reason, he/she must report to the office before attending class.
- Students who do not attend their assigned class or activity or who are habitually tardy will be considered truant. (Education Code §48260.)
- Students with patterns of unexcused absences, excessive excused absences and/or habitual tardies will be referred to the School Attendance Review Board (SARB) for discussion and/or disciplinary action.
- Students are responsible for making arrangements to make up work as soon as possible after

an absence or suspension. Work must be completed within the timeline established by the teacher or an administrator.

PLANNED ABSENCES

We strongly discourage travel during school days because students miss critical instruction. If travel is unavoidable and the absence will be between three and fifteen school days:

- The parent/guardian must come to the office to request and sign an Independent Study Contract.
- Requests must be submitted to the office at least five school days before departure.
- Completed Independent Study work must be returned to the teachers on the day that the student returns to school.
- Failure to return completed work will result in the absence being unexcused.
- Attendance will be credited based on the quality of the work submitted as well as quantity.

When an absence of less than five days is planned, students and parents should make arrangements regarding required work with their teachers and notify the office before the absence begins.

CLOSED CAMPUS

- School premises include the entire campus, any school buses, parking areas, and areas normally supervised by school personnel.
- School premises are closed to the public between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.
- Visitors must sign in at the main office.
- Students should not arrive on campus before 8:15 a.m. There is no adult supervision before that time.
- Once students arrive on campus, they are expected to stay at school.
- Students must leave campus within 10 minutes of dismissal, unless they are enrolled in Beyond the Bell, after school sports, clubs, or where assigned/arranged by school personnel.

EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION

- Parents must complete accurate emergency contact information during online registration. An Emergency Card will be generated using this information and will be kept in the office.
- Parents: it is critical for your student's safety and well being **that all information is current** in case of emergency. **Update any information on the card as changes occur** by calling the school office (650-903-6945) or sending the information in written form.
- At least one emergency contact must be for an adult at a **different address** and phone number from the family.

LEAVING CAMPUS DURING THE DAY

- **Only adults authorized on the Emergency Contact** (see above) must come to the office, call, or send a note to the school before a student may leave campus.
- Students must be signed out in the office before leaving campus indicating the exact time of departure.
- Parents: if you need to sign out your student during the lunch period, please notify the office no later than noon.

ILLNESS AND ACCIDENTS AT SCHOOL

If a student becomes ill at school, he/she should come to the office to rest and possibly return to class. If necessary, the parent or guardian will be called to arrange transportation home. Students must be signed out in the office before leaving school. Students should report all accidents and injuries to school personnel immediately. School personnel will give first aid for minor injuries. A parent or guardian will be notified of serious injuries or if follow-up care is needed.

MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

In accordance with state law, a student taking prescribed or over-the-counter medication at school **must** have a written statement on file from the physician and signed by the parent/guardian.

- All forms of medication must be checked in to the office. Students are not to hold onto medication on campus.
- No medication may be given to students until the correct form has been submitted.
- Medication must be sent to the school in a properly labeled prescription container.
- Requests to allow self-administration of medication, such as asthma inhalers, injections for anaphylaxis, diabetes, etc. must be made and approved in writing by the student's physician.
- Students may not bring any medication, including Tylenol, Ibuprofen, cough drops, etc. to school except as provided above.
